


Stonehouse - moving forward 1919 - 1939

Entrepreneurs saw the potential for developing new modes of transport. As roads improved so horses gave way to bicycles, motorcycles and cars.

Reginald Baker was in the cavalry in WW1



In 1919 he set up a horse and cart haulage business.



In the 1930s he progressed to trucks and eventually opened Plough Motors, selling and repairing cars.

The Crown and Anchor was a coaching inn




In the1920s both horse and cart and motorcycles are parked outside.

A bus stop was built on the main road but cyclists still rode down the middle.




The stables were converted into a garage leading to a car park behind.
